Text:

Spiders, Spiders Everywhere! (Big book story)

Learning Activities:

Shared reading activity, art and craft activity

Learning Objectives:

> To understand and enjoy the story

> To understand the meaning of 'ten' and 'spiders'

To say 'ten' and 'spiders' when expressing their meaning

> To recognise the print of 'ten' and 'spiders'

Resources:

Pictures of spiders, materials for making spiders

What to do:

1 (Presenting the Text)

- Ask children to identify the title and the author of the book on the front cover. Talk about the illustrations on the cover.
- Ask children to predict: Where can the girl see the spiders?
- Write or draw children's predictions on the board.

2 (1st Reading)

- Read aloud the text with good intonation and expression.
- Help children understand and enjoy the story with the help of gestures and illustrations.
- Refer children to the illustrations and count the number of *spiders* with them while telling the story.
- After reading P.11, ask children: Where else can the girl see the spiders?
- Check the predictions with children.

3 (2nd Reading)

- Read aloud the text on P.2.
- Talk about the *spiders* in the illustrations.

- Show children some pictures of *spiders*.
- Write the word 'spiders' on the board.
- Ask children to find the word 'spiders' on P.2.
- Ask children to count the number of *spiders* in the illustrations with the teacher.
- Write the word 'ten' and ask children to say 'ten' and 'ten spiders' together.
- Ask children: How many fingers do you have? Show me ten fingers.
- Invite children to read the sentence after the teacher.

4 (3rd Reading)

- Invite children to read aloud P.2.
- Read aloud the rest of the book to children.

5 (Extended Activity)

Art and craft activity: Making a spider

- Give each child a paper plate.
- Ask them to draw eyes and a mouth and stick the legs on the paper plate.
- Guide children to talk about their *spiders* when they are making them.
- Let a few children show their *spiders* to the class and guide them to say '*spiders*'.

Learning Objectives:

> To understand and enjoy the story with the help of the illustrations

> To understand the meaning of 'nine'

> To say 'nine' when expressing its meaning

> To recognise the print of 'nine'

Resources:

Song poster, spiders (children's art work made in the

previous session)

What to do:

1 (Presenting the Text)

- Show the book and ask children to read aloud the title.
- Read aloud the author for children.
- Talk about the illustrations on the front cover.
- Ask children: Do you remember the ten spiders? Where were they?
- Write or draw children's answers on the board.

2 (1st Reading)

- Read aloud the text with good intonation and expression.
- Help children understand and enjoy the story with the help of gestures and illustrations.
- Refer children to the answers on the board and check the answers with children.

3 (2nd Reading)

- Read aloud the text on P.4.
- Talk about the illustrations.
- Count the number of spiders with children and write the word 'nine'

on the board.

- Invite children to find the word 'nine' in the book and say 'nine'.
- Invite children to read aloud the sentence after the teacher.

4 (3rd Reading)

- Invite children to read aloud P.2 and P.4.
- Read aloud the rest of the book to children.

5 (Extended Activity)

Singing: Ten Little Spiders

- Show a song poster of the song *Ten Little Spiders*.
- Track and read aloud the lyrics to children.
- Invite children to read after the teacher.
- Track the lyrics and sing the song once.
- Invite children to sing the song after the teacher.
- Help children understand the lyrics by showing the number of fingers.
- Invite children to sing the song with their spiders.

Lyrics of Ten Little Spiders

(Tune: Ten Little Indians)

One little, two little, three little spiders, Four little, five little, six little spiders, Seven little, eight little, nine little spiders, Ten spiders on the web.

Learning Objectives:

> To enjoy the story with the help of the illustrations

> To understand the meaning of 'eight'

> To say 'eight' when expressing its meaning

To recognise the print of 'eight'

Resources:

Toy spider, spider cutouts, pictures of tree, spiderweb and

sidewalk

What to do:

1 (Presenting the Text)

- Show the book and ask children to read aloud the title.
- Read aloud the author for children.
- Talk about the illustrations on the front cover.
- Ask children: *How many spiders were on the sidewalk? What were they doing?*
- Write or draw children's answers on the board.

2 (1st Reading)

- Read aloud the text with good intonation and expression.
- Help children understand and enjoy the story with the help of gestures and illustrations.
- Refer children to the answers on the board and check the answers with children.

3 (2nd Reading)

- Read aloud the text on P.6.
- Talk about the illustrations.
- Ask children: How many spiders are there in the picture?

- Count the number of spiders with children.
- Show a toy spider and ask children: How many legs does the spider have?
- Count the legs of the spider with children and write 'eight' on the board.
- Say: The spider has eight legs.
- Invite children to find the word 'eight' on P.6.
- Talk about the illustrations.
- Ask children: What are the spiders doing on the sidewalk?
- Show children a picture of a sidewalk to help them understand what it is.
- Ask children to read aloud the sentence with the teacher.

4 (3rd Reading)

- Invite children to read aloud P.2, P.4 and P.6.
- Read aloud the rest of the book to children.

5 (Extended Activity)

Game: Spider hunt

- Hide the spiders around the classroom before the activity.
- Let children find the spiders.
- Invite children to put the spiders on the picture of the spiderweb or in the tree or on the sidewalk.
- Remind children to match the number of spiders with the word (*eight*, nine, ten) on the pictures.
- Count the number of spiders with children.

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
