- who is holding a camera
- who wants to feed the monkeys
- with a beak and two wings
- with a long tail and brown fur
- The raincoats are all wet.
- Turtles have a hard shell and four legs.

c. To describe actions of people or events in the picture

- climbing over the fence
- clinging onto its mother
- eating a (banana/cookie)
- eating cookies
- holding an umbrella
- hugging each other
- looking at the beautiful flamingoes
- making a funny face
- playing with water
- scratching its head
- splashing in the water puddle
- swinging in the tree
- taking a photo/picture
- watching the (flamingoes/monkeys)

- Flamingoes are standing on one leg.
